How Poker Works?

Seating Positions:

- **Dealer:** The dealer button rotates clockwise each hand, determining who acts first in each betting round.
- **Blinds:** The small blind and big blind are forced bets posted by the two players to the left of the dealer button. The small blind is typically half the size of the big blind.
- **Early Position (EP):** Players seated to the left of the big blind. These positions act first in each round, making them less advantageous.

- **Middle Position (MP):** Players who act after the early position but before those in the late positions.
- **Late Position (LP):** The final players to act, including the Hijack, Cutoff, and the Dealer (Button). These positions are often the most advantageous.

Stages of a Poker Hand

Poker hands progress in different stages, with each stage offering an opportunity to bet, raise, or fold.

- **Pre-Flop:** Each player is dealt two private cards (hole cards). The first round of betting starts with the player to the left of the big blind.
- **Flop:** Three community cards are dealt face-up on the table. The second round of betting takes place, starting with the player left of the dealer.
- **Turn:** A fourth community card is dealt, followed by another round of betting. The betting amounts typically increase during this stage.
- **River:** The fifth and final community card is dealt, followed by the last round of betting.
- **Showdown:** If multiple players remain after the final round of betting, they reveal their cards. The player with the best five-card hand wins the pot.

Poker Hand Rankings

The objective of poker is to create the best possible five-card hand using a combination of your hole cards and community cards. Here are the hand rankings from the strongest to the weakest.



- **Royal Flush:** A, K, Q, J, 10, all of the same suit.
- **Straight Flush:** Five consecutive cards of the same suit.
- **Four of a Kind:** Four cards of the same rank.
- **Full House:** Three of a kind plus a pair.
- **Flush:** Five cards of the same suit, not in sequence.
- **Straight:** Five consecutive cards of mixed suits.
- **Three of a Kind:** Three cards of the same rank.
- **Two Pair:** Two cards of one rank and two cards of another rank.
- **One Pair:** Two cards of the same rank.
- **High Card:** If no one has a pair or better, the highest card wins.

Poker Variants

There are several types of poker games, each with its own set of rules and strategies. Here are two of the most popular variants:

- **Texas Hold'em:** Players receive two private hole cards. Five community cards are dealt in stages (Flop, Turn, and River). Players combine their hole cards and community cards to make the best hand.
- **Omaha:** Players receive four hole cards. They must use exactly two of these and three of the five community cards to make the best possible hand.

Additional Poker Features

In modern poker, certain features can enhance gameplay or offer additional options:

- **Rabbit Hunting:** A feature that lets players view the remaining community cards after a hand is finished, allowing them to see what would have happened had they stayed in the hand.
- **Running It Twice:** In cash games, if a player goes all-in before the river is dealt, they may agree to "run it twice". This means the remaining community cards (turn and river) are dealt twice, with half the pot going to the winner of each run.
- **EV Chop:** A feature that enables players to chop the pot based on their hand's equity if all players are all-in.
- **HUD (Heads-Up Display):** A tool that displays statistics about a player's actions and behaviour, which can be used to analyse and predict their playstyle.
- **Call Time:** A feature that gives players a specified amount of time to act during a betting round, ensuring smoother gameplay and decision-making.

Betting Rules & Limits

There are three primary betting formats in poker:

- **No-Limit:** Players can bet any amount of chips at any time. This is the most popular format for both cash games and tournaments.
- **Pot-Limit:** The maximum bet is the size of the current pot.
- **Fixed-Limit:** Betting amounts are predetermined, limiting how much can be wagered during each round.
